Dear Collector,

This is definitely the last bulletin for 2010 and to acknowledge two very special events on Norfolk Island in the coming days.

On 22nd November, Norfolk Island will hold the opening ceremony for the commencement of the World Champion of Champions Lawn Bowls. The ceremony is to be held on the lawns of the Bowling Club and the Philatelic Bureau will mark this occasion by presenting the club with a framed enlarged FDC with stamps produced especially for the Lawn Bowls Championship.

In the original write up in the local paper it was announced that around 25 countries from all corners of the world were sending representatives to vie for the honour of being crowned World Champion here on Norfolk Island.

The Norfolk Islander also reported that over forty players from Europe, Asia, Americas, Africa and Pacific regions will experience all that Norfolk has to offer, and their progress, throughout the competition, will be followed by supporters around the world.

Norfolk Island has been a member of World Bowls since 1987 representing at many World Bowls, Champion of Champions, World Cup Indoor, Commonwealth Games and Asia Pacific Championships with honourable results and performances, winning medals on

many occasions including a World Championship win in 1996.

The next event in the calendar of Norfolk Island stamp production, after the World Bowls Champion of Champions, is the celebration of the 130th Anniversary of the Consecration of St Barnabas Chapel, which was completed in December 1880 as a memorial to the martyred Bishop John Coleridge Patteson.

To acknowledge the 130th Anniversary, the Church of England is having a special commemorative service conducted by the regional Bishop Rob Forsyth, and the whole island is invited to worship. There will be a re-enactment of a couple of features from the original consecration service, including the singing of a hymn specially composed by Bishop John Selwyn.

St Barnabas Chapel is considered one of the finest historic buildings in the South Pacific. It was built as a College Chapel, with seats facing each other.

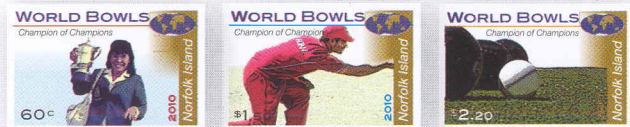
Taking pride of place is the 1876 Henry (Father) Willis organ. Other features include the floors and font of Devon marble, and the intricate timber and mother-of-pearl carvings and shell inlays. The magnificent stained glass windows come from the company of William Morris, and those over the sanctuary are designed by Burne-Jones.

World Bowls Champion of Champions



The game of bowls can be traced back as far as the 13th century.

National Bowling Associations were established in the late 1800s. In the then Victorian Colony (now the State of Victoria in Australia), the (Royal) Victorian Bowling Association was formed in 1880 and The Scottish Bowling Association was established in 1892, although there had been a failed attempt in 1848 by 200 Scottish clubs.

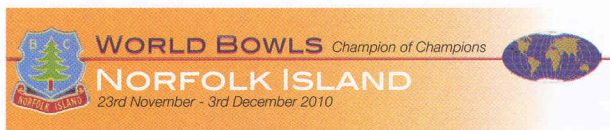
Lawn bowls is played on grass and variations from green to green are common.

Today the sport is played in over 40 countries with more than 50 member national authorities. The home of the modern game is still Scotland with the World Bowls centre in Edinburgh.

The Norfolk Island Bowling Club has a heritage going back to the first settlement when the club was established before any existed in Australia. Local Bowlers, men and women, have, over the years done exceptionally well in world class competition. The club is very welcoming and visitors are always encouraged to visit and have a game during their stay on the Island.

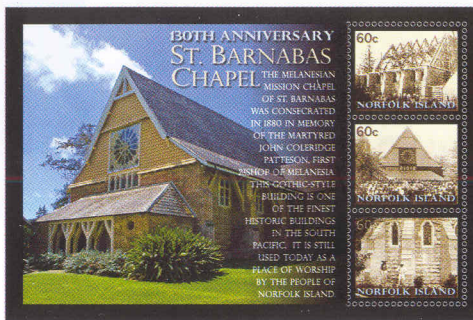
The World Champion of Champions is a contest held annually between bowlers who have won their respective nation singles title.

130th Anniversary of St Barnabas Chapel

St Barnabas was consecrated in 1880. The Chapel is a memorial to Bishop Patterson and others who gave their lives for the Melanesian Mission. The Chapel was designed by Sir J. G. Jackson of London and built by the Melanesian Mission Students with help from the Norfolk Islanders.

St Barnabas Chapel is also home to the beautiful stained glass windows featured in the 2009 Christmas Issue. These windows were designed by artists William Morris and Sir Edmund Burne-Jones.

In 2009 fund raising was carried out to replace the tiles on the Chapel roof. During the annual fete held at the Chapel the new tiles could be purchased by families and individuals and these tiles were engraved with the family's or individual's name prior to laying the tile as part of the new roof.

The Chapel has been used by the Church of England on Norfolk Island since the Melanesian Mission moved away in 1920.

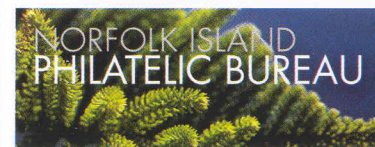
Bureau Housekeeping
